

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### INTRODUCTION



# Anticipating is Waiting



Are you in a hurry today? Are you already busy with holiday plans and activities? Are you barely keeping your head above water? This advent season is an opportunity for our hearts to return to the waiting room of God's promise delivered in Bethlehem.

You may be waiting for a prayer to be answered or light to outshine a certain area of darkness. Friend, be reminded today of what Micah promises. Look to the God of your salvation. He hears you and He sent His Son to redeem you from the curse of sin and darkness. His Spirit is with you as you read this. You are not alone. He loves. He cares. Anticipate His goodness today!

# Connecting the Dots

One of my favorite games as a kid was Connect the Dots. When I was younger and more restless in the church service, connecting the dots was my scapegoat. It didn't matter if the dots made an image or simply a game to make the most squares (a great game to play with a friend), the goal was making a connection with different points. As we anticipate Christmas morning this month, we must connect the dots of why Jesus had to come to the earth. Take a few moments and read today's passage.

In this rich passage, we see the powerful connection between the arrival and death of Jesus. Both the incarnation and the crucifixion are connected in the passage. Why did Jesus come? He came to die so that in Him, you may live. Jesus, who is fully God and fully man, came to the earth to defeat sin's curse on the cross. In His death, Jesus stripped the adversary of power. This is good news! We celebrate His arrival, because He is the promise of no more curse, no more condemnation, no more darkness.

This advent season, treat yourself to anticipate daily the promises fulfilled in Jesus. You don't have to fear death or succumb to evil, for Jesus, the Righteous One, defeated sin, death, and evil on the cross.

Today, try to connect the dots of the incarnation to the crucifixion. Go a step further and connect the dots from the resurrection to the ascension! And finally, connect the final dot...He will return. This is good news worth celebrating this advent season!

Today, be reminded of the purpose for the incarnation. Jesus came on a rescue mission. He came to redeem and restore. He came, because of the Father's love for you. In prayer, praise Him for that amazing love today.




## Advent is About Love


## A Selfless Christmas


Giving involves sacrifice and intentionality. As a child, I remember at times receiving money from dad in order to purchase a gift for mom. The gift was still a wonderful memory made, yet it came from my dad's wallet. There was no sacrifice on my end. 

Are you searching for contentment in the newest gadget, or in the Eternal Savior?




# A Better Way to Spend the Holidays


## The Best Family Ever

## Jesus Wins!



When Herod the king heard this, he was troubled, and all Jerusalem with him; and assembling all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for so it is written by the prophet:

"'And you, O Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who will shepherd my people Israel.'"

Then Herod summoned the wise men secretly and ascertained from them what time the star had appeared. 
# Wise People Continue Seeking

## Prepare the Way



Let's anticipate the birth and make sure our excitement is on Him above all.

Psalm 139:23-24 is important to read today. Are you preparing your heart by ridding yourself of sin? Preparing to celebrate the Savior this advent involves making more room for His light to shine in and through you. Don't waste the heart space for darkness. His light is better. I'm glad it started to shine in the wilderness.

Today, make plans to celebrate the birth of Jesus. Be intentional with your time. Above the holiday plans you make with family and friends, make sure you treasure Jesus above all. These are plans worth making each day.



# A Mispronounced Word

As a pastor, I speak a lot. With so many sermons preached each year, I'm prone to mispronounce words. Last advent season, I was preaching a sermon from Luke 1:46-55. In the excitement of my words, I said "MagnifiCAT." Notice the emphasis on CAT. Looking at the word, it should be pronounced in the church, "MagnifiKAAT." Some of my music staff friends have not forgotten my blunder. It still makes me smile as I write these words today.

You can't experience the advent season without reading Mary's words of worship. Following Gabriel's visit to her (Luke 1:26-38), we see her response to God's plans with a heart of worship and adoration. Mary and her cousin Elizabeth are heroines in the Gospel account given by Luke. I love reading Mary's words to her God. She gladly glorified Him, for she saw Him as magnificent above all.

I wonder, do you see Him as magnificent above all? God using Mary to deliver the Savior, is quite remarkable. Daniel Darling explained, "Mary, a daughter of Eve, would bear in her womb the second Adam, who would come to reverse the curse ushered on the human race and the cosmos by the disobedience of the first Adam." The baby Mary delivered would be the One that would deliver her and countless others. Mary's heart was full of exaltation, as she processed and responded to the good news.

This advent let us respond to the Gospel with glory and honor to God. Let's take a page from Mary's heart and maintain a heart of worship. In our lowly state like Mary (Luke 1:48) we can rejoice our God came to us.

Today, look at the glory, power, and majesty of God. See Him as truly magnificent above all. Use Mary's words to help you write your own words of adoration to the One that delivered you from sin.

Now the birth of Jesus Christ took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been betrothed to Joseph, before they came together she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. And her husband Joseph, being a just man and unwilling to put her to shame, resolved to divorce her quietly. But as he considered these things, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, saying, "Joseph, son of David, do not fear to take Mary as your wife, for that which is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins."

# An Unprepared Father



## Make Room!



Could it be true we get too busy this season and not make room for what really matters? Don't miss the blessing advent provides. Make room today for what really matters. Daniel Darling explained, "The One who had no home is making a home for us." Born and placed in a feeding trough, Jesus came to give us a room in glory (John 14:3). Let's clear our minds and schedules today and make room for Him.

Today, make room for Him. Spend time with Him without rush or hurry. Refuse to be busy all the time. It's ok and needed to slow down, to be still and know that He is God (Psalm 46:10).



## The Abundant Life



Charles Wesley famously wrote, "Light and life to all He brings, ris'n with healing in His wings. The Herald Angels Sing, because of the reminder of God's marvelous light in Christ Jesus. In the Son, there is light to shine over whatever you are facing today. The celebrated baby in Mary's arms is the giver of eternal and abundant life. Reflect on that promise today.

Nobody wants a thief in their home. When someone experiences a breakin, levels of trust and security are shattered. I believe one of the many tactics of the adversary is to break our level of trust and security in perilous times. Perhaps you are experiencing a break-in and you are searching today for answers and hope? I believe Jesus gives us the perfect answer to the onslaught. He came to give us life and that life is beyond measure. That life is far better and stronger than what the adversary can throw at us. There is no need to feel or live defeated today. Friend, look to the promises of John 10:10 and rejoice. That promise is for you.

Today is a good day for a reminder of the abundant life found in Jesus. You and I have that life today and forever. Trust Him with the pain. Trust Him with the sorrow. Trust Him with the doubts and confusion. Trust Him with the low points and discouragement. Trust Him with the thief's attack. Nothing can take away the life beyond measure He has delivered.

Today, spend time in prayer, seeking the Lord with the weight and pains of your life. Add Romans 15:13 to your reading today. May He fill you with all joy and peace.




## Advent is About Missions?

This is the only time of year when our culture celebrates songs about Jesus as Lord. Walking into stores and hearing O Holy Night, serves as an open door for Gospel conversations. What if we started asking questions about the songs people were singing? (I'm not referring to Grandma got run over by a reindeer). People are singing, decorating, and celebrating the hope of the Gospel without fully realizing the salvation they desperately need. Let's help people understand the saving truth found in singing songs such as:

Hark! The herald angels sing "Glory to the new-born king Peace on earth and mercy mild God and sinners reconciled" Joyful all ye nations rise Join the triumph of the skies With angelic host proclaim "Christ is born in Bethlehem" Hark! The herald angels sing "Glory to the new-born king" (Charles Wesley, 1739)

This world needs the hope of Jesus. Your family and friends need the hope of Jesus. Your neighbor and child's teacher needs the hope of Jesus. This Christmas, remember Jesus came, died, rose again, ascended, and now has sent us out today to share the good news. Will you be faithful to His call?



## The Heart of a Servant

Today's reading takes place just after Jesus had to deal with the prideful request of James and John. These two were on quite the power trip, wanting to be seated next to Jesus in full honor. As Jesus explained why He could not make that a guarantee, the disciples all became irritated. The words you will read today come from Jesus teaching the essence of greatness; service.

We all define greatness in different ways. When I turned six years old, my parents took me to a St. Louis Cardinals game. Mom and dad surprised me, "Happy Birthday David" on the large electronic board in the centerfield. In the same inning, back up catcher Steve Lake hit a homerun. At that moment, I thought he was the greatest. I told everyone I saw the greatest player of all time hit a homerun. Many years later, my friend Brian gifted me with a Steve Lake game-used bat as a wedding present. He only hit 18 home runs in his career, yet I think he is still great.

What is greatness? I believe Jesus wants us to understand today the answer to that question. Greatness is found in how we serve others; pointing them to Jesus. Serving strips us of unhealthy pride and sharpens our steps to walk in humility. The goal for our lives is to strive for the joy of Jesus while emptying ourselves of any unnecessary desire of self-centeredness. Pride is an ugly monster, especially during the holiday season when we tragically become more me-centered. C.S. Lewis wrote about pride, "Pride gets no pleasure out of having something, only out of having more of it than the next man... It is the comparison that makes you proud: the pleasure of being above the rest. Once the element of competition is gone, pride is gone." – C.S. Lewis, Mere Christianity. If you want greatness, serve someone today.

We serve because we have been served the greatest gift; King Jesus (Mark 10:45). A hot meal, a blanket, clothes, or a phone call of encouragement can go a long way on the path of greatness today. Live with the heart of a servant.

Today, find ways to serve someone. Look for opportunities for kingdom work by serving or meeting a need. Remember, the goal of serving others is to point them to Jesus!

Now there was a man in Jerusalem, whose name was Simeon, and this man was righteous and devout, waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. And it had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ. And he came in the Spirit into the temple, and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him according to the custom of the Law, he took him up in his arms and blessed God and said, "Lord, now you are letting your servant depart in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel." And his father and his mother marveled at what was said about him. And Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, "Behold, this child is appointed for the fall and rising of many in Israel, and for a sign that is opposed (and a sword will pierce through your own soul also), so that thoughts from many hearts may be Luke 2:25-35

## Worth the Wait!

Do you believe good food is worth the wait? Sadly, one of my many flaws is impatience. Some don't mind waiting a long time for good food. As I'm getting older, fast food is just about as appealing as a nice restaurant when the wait exceeds fifteen minutes. Some don't mind waiting because they know the reward ahead. Every advent season, I like to read the story of Simeon waiting to meet the Savior. Today, join me in reading this beautiful story of the reward found in waiting.

We don't know much about Simeon, other than what is in the text. He was righteous and devout. He was an exited old man waiting to meet the Messiah. Can you picture the scene in the temple when Mary and Joseph brought Jesus inside? It was like Christmas morning for this man as the waiting time was now fulfilled for his heart to hold the Savior. I like what Daniel Darling wrote, "Simeon carries the frail, newborn baby whose arms would one day carry Simeon from sin to salvation." For Simeon, lesus was worth the wait.

Perhaps you are in a waiting season right now. Perhaps you are waiting for what will happen next in your future. Perhaps you are waiting for answers or clarity. Perhaps you are waiting to visit a loved one or move into a new chapter of your life. In the waiting, look to Jesus.

As we wait to celebrate the birth of our Savior, let's take a note from Simeon's life book. Let's be devoted and intentional in our daily pursuit of the King. Good food, in my opinion, is not worth a long wait. Yet, Jesus is well worth the wait. Be excited...Christmas is almost here!

Today, continue trusting Jesus in the waiting room of life. Remind yourself of His many promises. Live devoted to Him, for He is always worthy of attention and adoration.

Oh sing to the Lord a new song: sing to the Lord, all the earth! Sing to the Lord, bless his name: tell of his salvation from day to day. Declare his glory among the nations, his marvelous works among all the peoples! For great is the Lord, and greatly to be praised; he is to be feared above all gods. For all the gods of the peoples are worthless idols, but the Lord made the heavens. Splendor and majesty are before him; strength and beauty are in his sanctuary. Ascribe to the Lord, O families of the peoples, ascribe to the Lord glory and strength! Ascribe to the Lord the glory due his name; bring an offering, and come into his courts! Worship the Lord in the splendor of holiness: tremble before him, all the earth! Say among the nations, "The Lord reigns! Yes, the world is established; it shall never be moved: he will judge the peoples with equity." Let the heavens be glad, and let the earth rejoice: let the sea roar, and all that fills it; let the field exult, and everything in it! Then shall all the trees of the forest sing for joy before the Lord, for he comes, for he comes to judge the earth. He will judge the world in righteousness. Psalm 96

# Sing With Anticipation



The birth is a reminder God is faithful. The birth is a reminder you can have living hope and perfect peace. Sing today in response to that good news.
